Lecha Dodi is a liturgical song sung in synagogue on Friday night as part of the Kabbalat Shabbat service. It was written in the 16th century by Rabbi Shlomo Halevi Elkabetz who was born in Saloniki Greece but lived and wrote in Safed, Israel.
